From the Pastor

Next week we move into the season of Lent. This season calls us to reflect on our lives. In much the same way the secular world suggests making resolutions for the new year, Lent invites us to choose a practice to deepen our lives of faith. Each individual is encouraged to prayerfully consider how they miss the mark in their desire to follow the Way of Christ. They imagine what practice of fasting from undesirable actions might be needed. Or they choose to add a practice that will bring them closer to God through prayer, journaling, and self-care. What will you choose?

God calls us to love. This Lent let us remember the great commandment, Love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength. Love your neighbor as yourself.

I invite you to consider the following practices for Lent available here.

- 1) **Pray for our church.** At the annual meeting we shared the leadership's recommendation to explore and revise our leadership structure. We are entering the process of looking at our founding documents, constitution and bylaws and imagining a new way of organizing the work of the congregation. We ask each member of the congregation to pray daily for our church and community. To that end, a **prayer calendar** is included in this newsletter. Keep it handy, on your dinner table, refrigerator, or beside your Bible and join your friends in praying each day for the work and ministry of our congregation.
- 2) **Reflect on the practice of nonviolence**. At the recommendation of the Spiritual Council, we will consider the Pledge of Nonviolence on Sunday, March 10. This practice is intended to give us tools for creating and maintaining caring and respectful relationships throughout our everyday lives. It addresses how we show respect for ourselves, other people, and nature in our language and actions at work and play.

In the coming months we will use this document to guide discussion of just and caring practices to guide our relationships with individuals and in community. It is recommended that the document be revisited each year, and we have chosen the First Sunday in Lent for our annual review which is also the Sunday the United Church of Christ observes as Racial Justice Sunday.

Along with the pledge you will receive a version that uses language for teaching the practice to young children.

3) **Special services and spiritual practice activities.** Join us for worship and times for reflection throughout Lent.

Ash Wednesday – Wednesday March 6 - 9 AM to 1 PM Ashes with Pastor Judy and 7 PM worship service will include a ritual of naming our intentions for lent, imposition of ashes, and communion.

Prayer Beads – Wednesday, March 20, 5 PM to 7-ish in the church Fellowship Hall. Bring your simple supper and learn about the many uses of prayer beads in various faith traditions. Then make your own according to Pastor Judy's design. I have been teaching this practice to groups for 15 years. Don't hesitate to come late if you work and are not available at the early hour. The activity will continue until all who wish to participate are "fed."

Labyrinth – Wednesday, April 3, 5 PM to 7-ish in the church Fellowship Hall. Bring your simple supper and learn about labyrinths in various cultures and faith traditions. Then walk the labyrinth or use a pencil or marker to follow a labyrinth drawn on paper. Don't hesitate to come late if you work and are not available at the early hour. The activity will continue until all who wish to participate are "fed."

Maundy Thursday, Thursday April 18, 6 PM in the church Fellowship Hall. Soup supper followed by Holy Week worship stations and communion service. Worship will begin at 7 PM.

Good Friday, Friday April 19, 7 PM. Worship in the Sanctuary.

4) Join us for **Book Club**. This spring during Lent, we will read and discuss <u>The Last Week: What the Gospels Really Teach about Jesus' Final Days in Jerusalem.</u> This book, written by Marcus J. Borg and John Dominic Crossan, will take us deeply into the meaning of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. We will meet on alternate Mondays

Monday, March 11 – 7:00 pm – Preface and Chapters 1 & 2 – Palm Sunday, Monday, Monday, March 25 – 7:00 pm – Chapters 3 & 4 – Tuesday, Wednesday Monday, April 8 – 7:00 pm – Chapters 5 & 6 – Thursday, Friday Monday, April 22 – 7:00 pm – Chapters 7 & 8 – Saturday, Easter Sunday

5) Finally, if you are looking for something fun, try Lent Madness. In its tenth year, Lent Madness offers an opportunity to learn about the saints of all time and have fun while doing it. UCC Daily Devotion for February 28, 2019

Homeless, by Donna Schaper

If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast. - Psalm 139:9-10

Lots of people are homeless, for real. Their belongings (what a strange word) are all in one bag. They sleep outside. Some are urban pioneers and sleep on church steps or under highways. They don't like shelters. They are shelter makers. Some have communities and know the schedules for the local soup kitchens. They rise at dawn. They head south in the winter. They depend on what can only be called the right hand of God.

Even more people are spiritually homeless. They/we have a bed and sheets. We wonder if we should declutter or if we have too many belongings. We wonder if we are taking proper care of the boiler or the gutters. We also rise at dawn and reach out for the right hand of the Almighty and wonder where it went.

Congregations are soup kitchens for the spiritually hungry. They are shelters for the spiritually homeless. Respite lodging for the people who are in need of respite. Domiciles for the spirit. Nests for the baby bird in all of us, no matter how old we are. Nursing homes for those who can't bathe or tie their own shoes any more. Rehab centers for those who should have done prehab but forgot. Habitats for humanity.

Life is one long displacement and replacement. Where did we put that belonging that mattered the most to us? Not our cell phone or our keys. The belonging that matters most is our belonging to that right hand, the One, habitually reaching for us.

Prayer

When displacement and replacement follow us around, make a place for us, Right-handed One.

We'll forego a second mission offering during worship in March.

To make it a little more fun, we will build houses on the back wall of the sanctuary using removable "puzzle" pieces, each representing a "share" of the work Grant & Ben will perform. The "shares" for purchase will be in various increments so that you can select your share as part of the mission project. Our hope is that by the end of the Lenten season, we will have "given up" enough support to pay the balance of their trip, totaling \$1000.




