The Music & Worship Ministry Team is EXCITED to announce our new *House Band*. They were with us for Holy Week. Then, beginning in April, *House Band* will be with us in worship on the 3rd Sunday each month, funded via the Special Music Fund.

Introducing the members of our "House Band"...

<u>Carson DeAngelis</u> has been playing piano since a young age, when he got access to a second-hand keyboard. Carson was trained with the piano classically until he became a student at School of Rock while he was a teenager, where he met Anthony Newett and benefited from training with him and other experienced musicians.

After gaining performance experience as a student at School of Rock, Carson began to play professionally for brunch and banquet venues as well as becoming very passionate about teaching.

Carson has worked as a piano teacher for over two years. He began teaching lessons at Strand Studios Learning Center for Music, Film, and Acting in 2022 and later that year at School of Rock, alongside his former teachers. We thank Carson for sharing his talents with us!

Brian Hernandez (drums) is Anthony's right hand man with any music related stuff. He is a graduate of Easton Area High School, class of 2021 and also graduated from the Easton School of Rock in 2022. The fully vetted families (no more than 14 persons total) arrive via bus to our Fellowship Hall at 6 PM daily for one week. Volunteers from our congregation serve the families dinner that has been prepared by other volunteers.

After dinner clean up, the families may retreat to their "rooms", pack lunches for the next day, or sit around and talk. Occasionally, there is an opportunity for the volunteers to read to the little ones, play games with the older children, or attempt to help with the dreaded homework.

Now here is the FUN part... the overnight volunteers arrive at 8:30 PM for a sleepover!!!! Yes, just like when you were a kid, you could relive those days of sleeping bags at a friend's home. (only there are no sleeping bags and these are friends you haven't yet met, and there is no loud music or food in the rooms)

We are offering anyone willing to try the Family Promise Volunteer experience, a chance to join the fun May 26-June 2 (cots or mattress of your choice provided).

There are openings in all positions (food prep, evening host and for the coveted overnight hosting). There is minimal training required and will be provided along with assistance to obtain the necessary clearances. Volunteers always work with a partner and are a phone call away from our coordinator, Sue Roth.

Got Anxiety? You are not alone!

Anxiety is intense worry or fear over everyday events. This can be fear of a specific threat or vague feelings inside like uneasiness or a feeling of being out of control or dying. Anxiety manifests in the body with physical sensations such as sweating, chest tightness, increased heart rate, restlessness, and shaking. Anxiety also takes place in the mind with excessive worrying, fear of embarrassment, and catastrophic thinking. Causes can include change/adjustment, negative life events, trauma, isolation, stress, physical or mental health problems, or social pressure.

Statistics show that nearly 20% of individuals have an anxiety disorder. According to the National Institute of Health one third of adults reported experiencing anxiety and depression symptoms in 2023. Half of that number is accounted for by young people ages 18-24. Anxiety can lead to feeling frozen, not speaking up, or feeling uneasy and detached. While some anxiety is natural and can help us to make decisions and to prepare, when anxiety becomes too overwhelming and interferes with everyday functioning, it's important to practice coping strategies. If anxiety persists, consider treatment, such as therapy or medication.

Thankfully, anxiety can be reduced by practicing ways to care for ourselves. Coping strategies need to address the body, behaviors and emotions. Lifestyle and wellness practices include minimizing caffeine, avoiding drugs and alcohol, getting enough sleep and good nutrition, being physically active/exercising, having supportive relationships in which one can ask for help, keeping organized and growing a sense of meaning and spirituality. Awareness of thoughts that drive and sustain anxiety and replacing these with believable, factual ideas, and practicing helpful, encouraging self-talk is an ongoing need. Practicing relaxation with deep breathing techniques, mindfulness, imagery, stretching, time in nature, connecting with others and with interests are all ways we can manage and reduce anxiety. There is hope!

Mark Adams Linda Altrichter Jayne Christman Nanci Snyder Matt Stalter Our Consistory met on Thursday, March 21, 2024. Karen Griffith, Moderator, led us in the Leadership Prayer. Devotions were offered by Linda Altrichter, who read an article entitled *Keep Going* from 365 Devotions for Peace.

The Consent Agenda Reports were reviewed by Consistory prior to this meeting. The Property report was moved to the Discussion Agenda portion of our meeting for more discussion. We reviewed and approved all reports on the Discussion Agenda - Financial Secretary's and Treasurer's Reports, and Secretary's Minutes of the February 15 Consistory Meeting and the March 3 Special Consistory Meeting. Lee Stephens (on behalf of the Property Team) led a discussion on the Annex, while Grant Field reported that he has finished repainting the door frames around our church building and would like to begin some other renovations that were put on hold while we were pursuing the Family Promise partnership. Now that this was rejected by South Whitehall Township, Grant is proposing to repaint walls in the narthex/lobby area and then move on to the second floor church office. A motion was made and approved to allow Grant and Lee to move ahead with some of the renovations, starting with the narthex and church office, and a starting budget of \$500.

The Pastor's Report was reviewed and accepted. Many items to note: Pastor is on vacation April 5 thru April 15. The children and their teachers will lead worship on April 7; Bart Tizio and Mary Helfrich will share Faith Testimonies on April 14. April 21 is Earth Day and Blanket Sunday. Vacation Bible School is scheduled for June 18, 19, 20 (6-8 pm) and June 25, 26, 27 (2-4 pm) - ages preschool thru 5th grade, followed by a showcase on June 30. Last day of Sunday School for this year is June 9, with outdoor worship followed by a picnic.

Our next meeting is Thursday, April 18 at 4:00 pm.

APRIL

From the Latin word *aperio*, "to open" (bud), because plants begin to grow during this month.

The origin of April Fools' Day is unknown, but theories place its start hundreds of years ago. Some theorize that the idea of April Fools' Day dates back to ancient Rome and a festival called Hilaria held at the end of March, where people would dress up in disguises and mock or imitate others.

Many folklorists believe it may go back to 16th century France. Charles IX decreed that the new year would begin on January 1. Back in those times, New Year's Day was around Easter and spring festivals marked the occasion with a whole week of partying. Some people were slow to catch on to the change, continuing to celebrate the new year. They quickly became the victim of jokes and pranks, including have paper fish put on their backs and labeled a "poisson d'avril," meaning April fish.

The timing of April Fools' Day is suspiciously close to the Vernal Equinox - this year on March 19. It is the time of year when Mother Nature is known to play tricks on us all with unpredictable changes to the weather, including:

- In 1923, temperatures reached -34 degrees F in Bergland, Michigan.
- In 1960, up to 10 inches of heavy snow fell in eastern South Dakota causing some highways to close due to difficulty plowing the heavy snow.
- In 1997, a blizzard from Maryland to Maine resulted in power outages and roads impassable. East Jewett, New York recorded 37 inches and 25.4 inches fell in Boston, Massachusetts.

April Fools' Day is all about getting someone to fall for a prank or a made-up story.

- In 1983, Boston University professor Joseph Boskin created a story about the origin of April Fools' Day when speaking to an AP reporter. He said the day originated when Roman Emperor Constantine agreed to let one of his jesters become "king for a day." Boskin, of course, made the entire story up.
- In 1957, The BBC aired a story on how Swiss farmers were experiencing a bumper crop for spaghetti, complete with a video of people harvesting noodles from trees.
- On April 1, 1996, Taco Bell announced it had purchased the Liberty Bell and would rename it the Taco Liberty Bell.
- A 2008 BBC broadcast tricked viewers into believing that a certain breed of penguins had displayed the ability to fly.

April Fools' pranks to try at home:

- 1. Dump out the salt from the kitchen shaker and replace it with sugar.
- 2. Put a whoopie cushion under one of the sofa cushions.
- 3. Change the time on every clock in the house by one hour.
- 4. Cover the remote sensor with a piece of tape or remove the batteries. It will drive the TV watcher crazy.
- 5. Place bubble wrap under an area rug for an instant surprise.
- 6. Unscrew the shampoo bottle and place plastic wrap over the hole. Washing their hair will never be so difficult.
