FACT SHEET: Humane RESPONSES

As an organization rooted in faith, Church World Services believes that all people deserve to lead lives of dignity, wherever we find ourselves. In 2021, weather-related disasters displaced nearly 24 million people globally. Other climate impacts are being felt more gradually. Gradual or "slow-onset" impacts are changes people feel every day, but don't always get the press like massive storms and wildfires do. Examples of gradual impacts include: temperature increases, changes in rainfall patterns, and saltwater intrusion of farmland or drinking water.

Both science and human experience tell us that slow-onset climate change will affect, and in some cases devastate, vulnerable communities in the future. It already impacts how, when, and where we move — and, in some cases, whether moving out of harm's way is even an option.

That's why your CROP Hunger Walk is so important. You're helping CWS address climate change impacts by helping farmers access seeds and learn new techniques for growing food in changing soil; teach building techniques so schools and homes can be built differently to withstand future natural disasters; and assists communities in learning new income generating skills like beekeeping to adapt and build resilience.

Ant's Corner

Inside Edition, Part 7 "Selective Hearing"



My mother had a running joke with my father, frequently accusing him of having "selective hearing". It seemed to surface most often when he conveniently "couldn't hear" what she was saying, yet he somehow managed to catch every single word of dialogue in the James Cagney movie he was

watching—even if the volume was turned down low. The irony was hard to ignore: he had no trouble following the intricate plot lines on the screen, but he somehow missed her clear request to take out the kitchen trash.

Was my dad really hard of hearing? Probably not. It's much more likely that he was hyper-focused on Mr. Cagney, completely zoning out anything else, including my mom's requests. And while selective hearing has been the butt of many jokes, mostly aimed at husbands who can't hear chores being assigned, what if there was a way to turn the concept of selective hearing into something useful, powered by modern technology?

Let's set aside, for now, the lengthy debates about how Artificial Intelligence (AI) might harm society, including concerns about how it fuels the instant-gratification mindset of younger generations. Instead, let's focus on one of the exciting ways AI is being used for the betterment of humanity. One particularly promising development comes from researchers at the University of Washington: an innovation called *Target Speech Hearing* (TSH).

Target Speech Hearing is a fascinating breakthrough that could revolutionize how we deal with noisy environments, especially for those with a hearing impairment. The technology leverages AI in a way that's similar to tools I've already started incorporating into my teaching and music preparation for UCCG. Think about how, in the realm of music production, algorithms are now able to isolate individual instruments and voices from a mixed track, something that was once thought impossible. Well, TSH takes this concept to the next level—not just for music, but for human speech. It uses a sophisticated algorithm that's capable of isolating and amplifying a SPECIFIC voice, even in a chaotic environment full of overlapping conversations and background noise.

Here's how it works: TSH technology can identify the unique "fingerprint" or "voice print" of a particular person's voice. This allows it to filter out all the other voices and ambient noise in the surrounding environment, effectively locking onto that one voice and amplifying it in a way that feels natural and seamless. The real magic happens in the implementation—this technology is built directly into a pair of hearing aids. So, it's not

just a cool concept; it actually has the potential to give people Superman-like hearing powers, allowing them to focus on one voice amidst a sea of sounds.

According to an article published by the *Association for Computing Machinery*, these TSH hearing aids combine traditional noise-cancellation technology with a cutting-edge AI neural network. This network enables the hearing aids to recognize and isolate the voice of the person the user wants to hear. What's more, the process is simple and quick. The user simply looks at the person they want to focus on for about three to four seconds. This "Enrollment Process" allows the AI algorithm to gather enough data to create a profile of that person's voice. From that point on, the hearing aids filter out all other sounds and zero in on that one voice, making it crystal clear. In some test environments, even when users walked away from their target speaker in a noisy room, the voice remained as clear as if they were still standing right next to each other.

The implications of this technology are enormous. Imagine being able to have a conversation with someone in a bustling restaurant without struggling to hear them over the clatter of dishes, the hum of conversations, or the noise from the kitchen. Or picture a teacher being able to hear a student's question from the back of a noisy classroom without straining. This could be life-changing for people who have hearing difficulties, particularly in noisy settings. For the elderly or those with hearing impairments, this innovation might mean the difference between feeling isolated in social situations and being able to fully participate.

As of now, there's no official word on when these hearing aids will be available to the public, but experts speculate that an affordable version could hit the market within the next couple of years. Given how quickly AI-driven technologies are evolving, it wouldn't be surprising to see this hit shelves sooner rather than later.

While my father didn't need an AI-powered hearing aid to "tune out" my mother, it's clear that TSH could bring a whole new meaning to selective hearing. And who knows, maybe one day we'll all have the ability to tune out the noise of everyday life and focus only on what truly matters—whether that's a conversation with a loved one, or, in my dad's case, the charismatic voice of James Cagney. A personal word of caution to fellow husbands: Be careful not to use this tech to ignore your spouse, for it may result in a frying pan to the head!



Let's fill the shelves on the side walls of our sanctuary with non-perishable foods for this worthy mission!



Our 2024 recipient of the items donated at our campfire was Turning Point - an organization that assists domestic abuse survivors and their children. Sue Sawyer shopped clearance sales all year long and purchased items with a retail value of \$3,514.66 for the purchase price of \$727.91.

Following is a list of the items purchased. 5 coffee makers, 3 electric skillets, 10 toasters, 2 hand mixers, 3 children's comforters, 15 x 3 pc towel sets, 47 kitchen towels, miscellaneous kitchen items, 4 x 16 pc stoneware dishes, 12 sets of sheets, 11 plush throw blankets, 15 hygiene items, 65+ children's sleepwear and clothing, 1 new booster seat, one backpack, lunch bag, and school supplies, and many Christmas gift items - plus toys, dolls, playsets, crayons and coloring books, cars and miscellaneous toys.

Thank you to Sue Sawyer for doing all the shopping. Thank you also to Sue for inviting all of us to her home for an afternoon of food, games and laughter.

Family Promise has negotiated a partnership with United Federal Credit Union. They assist families who are often ignored by other banks. They are willing to open credit accounts for the families in our program, giving them \$50 to open the account as well as \$5 to open a savings account

The partnership expands to the entire staff and volunteers of Family Promise of Lehigh Valley. Benefits offered are health savings accounts, life insurance, etc. They were formerly known as Gold Credit Union, who have been in business for 75 years.

UFCU has recently donated \$5,000 to Family Promise Lehigh Valley.

Family Promise and UCCG have teamed up with the Lehigh Conference of Churches to promote awareness of homelessness and hunger. This is an annual event where various fundraising events have been organized to educate the community and raise support to those who find themselves homeless or hungry.

UCCG will be a host site for this event. Participants can either sleep in their car or in a cardboard box. Sleeping in a cardboard box retains better heat. People participating are asked to get sponsors. All donations will go to Family Promise.

The event begins at 7:00 pm for check-in and setting up your sleeping arrangements. Please eat dinner before arriving. If you would like to contribute to the event, we would love to have some donuts, hot chocolate, hand warmers, a case of bottled water or whatever you would like to bring. - E Encourage Self-Help/Other Support

Why Do Fall Leaves Change Color?

Why Do Trees Change Color? - The main reason for the eye-popping color change is not autumn's chilly weather, but sunlight – or rather, the lack of daylight. Day and night are roughly equal in length on the autumnal equinox in late September, but afterward, nights are growing longer and days shorter. As the autumn days shrink, the reduced daylight tells deciduous plants that it's time to stop gathering energy and get ready for the dormant season – winter. Not all leaves turn vivid colors in autumn. Only a few of our many species of deciduous trees – notably maple, aspen, oak, birch, and gum – produce truly stellar performances for our annual autumn spectacular in North America.

What Weather Conditions Bring the Best Fall Foliage? - While daylight is the main factor that brings on fall foliage, several other factors contribute to how bright fall colors are: temperature, precipitation, and soil moisture.

Where Can You Find the Best Fall Foliage? - Some level of autumnal foliage changes in most regions of North America, but it is New England, the upper Midwest, the Rocky Mountains and parts of the Appalachians that hold the jackpot for leaf peepers. The right climate and light conditions and an abundance of tree varieties that hoard colorful pigments come together in these places.

Catching a Falling Leaf Is Auspicious



Next time an autumn leaf blows past your face, <u>try to catch it</u> — legend has it that it will bring good luck, or that you get to make a wish on it. The superstition can get more complex depending on the color and type of leaf you catch: A red leaf (or maple leaves in general) could mean good luck in love, and an orange leaf could mean inner transformation. Ginkgo leaves symbolize enlightenment, as well as hope and resilience. How long does the good luck last? It could be a week Linda Altrichter or a month or the whole season, <u>depending on who you're talking to</u>. After you catch it, you can release it back into the wind or bring it inside to incorporate into your seasonal decor.
