Ant's Corner "Loss, Love, and What Comes Next?"



Lately, I've been thinking a lot about loss—specifically, the kind that comes through death.

Just days ago, my dear friend of 40 years, John Seabrook, passed away. His wife, Anne, texted this to me: "Anthony, this is the hardest thing I've had to deal with in my entire life. But I know God will see me through this." Her words stayed with me—not just because of the pain behind them, but because of the quiet confidence in her faith.

And then, this morning, Sheri Stephens' father passed away. Not long ago, the Lakatosh family lost both Linda and Scott. I had the privilege of sitting with Scott a couple of times in his final days. He was still fully aware. He told us, more than once, that he didn't want to go. This had a lasting, profound effect on me. I can't imagine what that is like, and it made me very sad for him. But his family and Pastor Janet were there, offering comfort and repeatedly reminding him that God was waiting with open arms. I truly don't know how much of a comfort this was to him, but there was a noticeable change in his demeanor.

I've experienced many losses over the years. But the one that changed me the most was losing my dad. I think of him every single day. And sometimes, I catch myself doing something that reminds me of him—my tone, a mannerism, a laugh. When that happens, I wear it like a badge of honor. He was a great man. I want to be even more like him. If part of him lives on in me, I consider that a gift. And, it feels as if he's still around.

Of course, grief isn't new. Humanity has been grappling with it since the beginning. Different cultures and religions have their own ways of making sense of it all. In many Eastern traditions, death is seen as a natural part of life—a transition rather than an end. In African cultures, death is often celebrated as a journey to the next world. In contrast, much of Western culture tends to avoid the topic altogether, pushing it aside with medical advances and distraction. As secularism has grown, so has the uncertainty. Without a spiritual framework, many are left without language or rituals for loss.

As members of the United Church of Christ, many of us take a different approach than some other branches of Christianity. While there may be questions about hell and eternal damnation, we believe in a God of grace and love. Pastor Janet once told me her former mother-in-law, a devout Catholic, is genuinely afraid of dying. It would be speculation to suggest that due to her upbringing, a part of her is afraid of where she may go. I'm not slamming Catholicism, however, that kind of fear—the fear of punishment—is simply wrong for me. I love this life and want to stay as long as I can. But I'm not haunted by the idea of eternal suffering.

Still, the questions remain: Do we go to a literal heaven, with golden streets and angelic choirs? Or do we enter into some beautiful union with God—one that transcends place or time? Do we live on in the hearts and habits of those who loved us, like my dad lives on in me? Or are these stories simply the scaffolding we build to make sense of our grief? The truth is, no one knows for sure. No one's come back to give us the full report.

But, maybe that's OK, because in the face of death, we do what we've always done: We tell stories, we sit with the dying, we cry, we remember, we honor. We live—and in doing so, we carry the dead with us... for as long as we live! Maybe that's not an ending at all. I am choosing to believe that it's the beginning of something eternal.

"How Social Media Affects Kids'
Mental Health"

Social media has become such a key component of most people's lives that it is easy to think that it has always been there. SixDegrees, created in 1997, was the first social media site similar to the format known today. When SixDegrees shut down in 2001, Friendster, LinkedIn, MySpace, and Facebook soon took root. The University of Maine reports there are now 4.8 billion social media users worldwide, representing 92.7% of all internet users. And according to the American Family Survey 2023, 96% of parents say their kids have access to at least one social media platform. Many use multiple online platforms daily.

Although social media may have originated as a means to bring people together, there are many who argue that it actually does the opposite. Instances of cyberbullying, which is a form of online harassment, have grown as social media has become more pervasive. Some experts believe that mental health concerns are an unexpected side effect of increased social media use, says John Hopkins Medicine. In fact, in the spring of 2023, United States Surgeon General Vivek Murthy, MD, MBA, released an advisory that suggested social media is harmful to young people. In 2024, Dr. Murthy called for a surgeon general's warning not unlike the warnings on cigarette packages.

How might social media affect children's health? Here are some of the main concerns:

- Changes in a developing brain: according to the Surgeon General's report, children's brains go through a highly sensitive period of development between the ages of 10 and 19, when feelings of self-worth are forming. Frequent social media use may affect these feelings as children compare themselves to others they see online. In addition, functions like emotional learning, impulse control and emotional regulation may be affected.
- Development of depression: John Hopkins Medicine says research has demonstrated that there are high rates of depression attributed to very low social

media use and very high social media use. Finding a healthy balance might not be as it seems.

- Addiction: there is some evidence that children become addicted to checking social media, which can lead to addiction-like behaviors in other areas. According to The Addiction Center, a Web-based substance abuse resource, addiction to social media is driven by an uncontrollable urge to log on that impares other important areas of life. Fear of missing out (FOMO) is another threat to kids' mental health.
- Low Self-Esteem Issues: Children and teenagers who compare themselves to others' carefully curated online profiles (which usually are not telling the whole story) can develop feelings of inadequacy and body image issues.
- Exposure to Inappropriate Content: Social media may introduce children to
 content and images that are not appropriate for their age levels and capacity to
 understand and interpret. According to Dr. Murthy's report, deaths have been
 linked to suicide—and self-harm-related content—such as risk-taking challenges or
 asphyxiation content. Viewing this content normalizes this behavior for some
 youngsters.

Although plenty of good can come from social media, parents are urged to exercise caution when giving children access to these platforms, which can affect kids mental health in negative ways.

May 18: Mental Health Sunday

The UCCG Mental Health Team will be planning and leading worship on May 18, 2025. The third Sunday of May is designated as Mental Health Sunday by the National UCC, as a way to grow awareness, share stories, provide education and support for those struggling and the ones who love and care for them. April Consistory Meeting



To let you know what your leadership discusses for 2-½ hours once a month, I thought I would give you an update ...

- 1. We reviewed and approved all the reports, as we do every month
- 2. Discussed making some of the financial reports more user friendly and informative for the Ministry team leads. The Finance and Budget Team will be working on this.
- 3. Evangelism is hosting a Gourmet Pancake Breakfast on May 10 AND STILL NEEDS HELP. The sign-up sheet is on the bulletin board outside of the pastor's office.
- 4. Mental Health Ministry is suggesting a Safety Task Force be formed to review our Safe Church Policies, PNEC Disaster Manual and our response to drugs, alcohol, and firearms on site. Members of this team will be volunteers from the congregation...see article in this Echoes.
- 5. Grant reviewed the final stages of the remodel project. He and Lee will be working on the Nursery School classrooms this spring and summer, painting, repairing walls and installation of new carpet. They will need help to empty the rooms when school ends in June ... stay tuned...
- 6. The Property Team will need help raking and shoveling ground in the Annex front yard where the sewer pipe was replaced. Please watch for Lee's call to arms when he is ready for help!
- 7. CHAIR LIFT for FELLOWSHIP HALL back stairs!!!! Yes, we are doing this!! Lee has gotten several estimates and the chairlift will cost close to \$7000 (includes permits). The chairlift will be located on the right side of the back stairwell. The chair folds up when not in use and comes with 2 remotes. We will start raising money immediately. Watch for the chair/stair donation chart on the bill tree bulletin board.

At the suggestion of the Mental Health Team, Consistory has approved the development of a Safety Task Force for UCCG. This team will review our Safe Church Policies (2020), the PNEC Disaster Manual and other references to develop a written policy for situations that may arise. The final document will be presented to the congregation for adoption.

Considering the unrest targeting religious institutions in the last few years, a policy addressing church safety, including but not limited to drugs, alcohol, firearms, and door locking is important.

Our members and visitors deserve a place of worship where they feel comfortable and safe.

Rules for submission:

- 1. Submission (herein referred to as "logo") **must be received no later than May 15, 2025** and should be emailed **ONLY** to keystonelogo2025@gmail.com.
- 2. Individual submitting logo must be a member of a local church in one of the current PA UCC conferences.
- 3. Logo must be able to be reproduced in very small (1") and very large (banner) formats.
- 4. The logo must be easy to reproduce (e.g. shirts, hats, pens, etc.), thus there should be no gradients of colors.
- 5. Submissions must be in high resolution PNG format.

<u>Suggestions for submission:</u>

- 1. Color palettes may follow the UCC color palettes but it is not required. The UCC color palettes can be found here;
- https://www.ucc.org/who-we-are/about/brand-guidelines/color-guide/.

If using a color similar to one of the UCC colors, we do recommend the use of the UCC color.

- 2. Logo can be two parts; a visual that can stand alone and used in small reproductions (lapel pin) and a set of words (e.g. The Keystone Conference) that could be added to larger reproductions.
- 3. The logo cannot represent all of what the Keystone Conference embodies but should be a representation of who we are/our purpose. It should make sense without explanation.
- 4. The logo may represent our heritage (4 conferences as one) but is not required.
